### **Foreword**

The 2012 Annual Statistical Review is a snapshot of the Island's economy, population and social make-up. There are a number of interesting facts found throughout its more than 100 data tables, including details of our province's economic performance in 2012.

These data tables give us current, as well as historic, socio-economic information about Prince Edward Island. Over the years, we have found it to be an indispensable reference on the Island population and its economy. As a government, we use the information found in the Annual Statistical Review to make some important policy decisions. It helps us determine where, and when, programs and services are needed.



The information within the Annual Statistical Review is compiled from a variety of sources, including, provincial government departments, the private sector and Statistics Canada.

The information we receive from Statistics Canada is important, and significant. I remain concerned about the federal government decision to abolish the mandatory long-form census. This is the first year we are relying upon data gathered through the "voluntary" National Household Survey. The data is not as complete as it has been and I sincerely hope that the federal government will look at reinstating the long-form version for the 2016 census.

Despite this challenge, the people within our Statistics Bureau were able to gather enough facts and figures to complete a 2012 Review. I would like to personally thank them for their hard work and diligence.



## A Historical Note

Before the European explorations, Prince Edward Island was frequently used by the Mi'kmaq People for fishing, hunting and some planting. The Mi'kmaq called the island *Epekwitk*, meaning "cradle on the waves." Europeans later changed the pronunciation of the name to *Abegweit*. Historians credit the European discovery of the Island to Jacques Cartier, the French navigator, who claimed the Island for Francis I, King of France, on July 1, 1534. In 1720 the Island, then called *Île Saint Jean*, was colonized by 300 French settlers, sponsored by a commercial company of the Comte de Saint Pierre. The Island was ceded to Great Britain in 1763. Two years later the designated capital city of the *Island of St. John* took on the name *Charlotte Town* in honour of Queen Charlotte, wife of King George III of England. In 1799 the colony was renamed Prince Edward Island in honour of Edward, Duke of Kent, who was then commander of the British forces in North America. Prince Edward Island is known as the "Cradle of Confederation", because the Charlottetown Conference, held there in 1864, initiated the movement toward Canada's federation. The Island became a province in 1873.

The Armorial Bearings¹ of the Province of Prince Edward Island, shown above, were proclaimed to come into force on December 13, 2002. The centrepiece is the Shield of Arms, granted by King Edward VII in 1905, featuring the English heraldic lion, a large oak tree on the right and three young saplings on the left. The mature tree originally represented England, while the three saplings stand for the three counties - Kings, Queens and Prince. Scrolled along the bottom of the Shield of Arms are the Latin words *Parva Sub Ingenti*, which, when translated, read: *The small under the protection of the great*. The surrounding elements of the Armorial Bearings illustrate significant characteristics of the province, its position in the Canadian federation, its founding peoples and its natural resources.



Winter is the ideal time for sighting the Blue Jay, its shrill cries cutting the silence of the crisp winter air.



#### Samuel Holland's Survey of the Island of St. John

Captain Samuel J. Holland surveyed and mapped Prince Edward Island, then known as the Island of St. John, between 1764 and 1766. During the survey, Holland used innovative instruments such as the astronomical clock and the refracting telescope. His work was so accurate that many of the boundaries for lots and parishes he mapped are still used today. (Image: National Library and Archives Canada).

## **Economic Review 2012**

#### Overview

GDP by industry for Prince Edward Island expanded by 1.2 per cent in 2012. Leading growth sectors in the province were (in 2002 chained prices): real estate and rental and leasing (up by \$20.2 million or 3.3 per cent), manufacturing (up by \$18.9 million or 5.0 per cent), agriculture, forestry, fishing and hunting (up by \$18.4 million or 7.2 per cent), and education services (up by \$7.6 million or 2.2 per cent). Sectors showing declines were construction (down by \$31.2 million or 10.4 per cent), other services (down by \$1.8 million or 1.6 per cent), administrative and support, waste management and remediation services (down by \$1.5 million or 1.4 per cent) and management of companies and enterprises (down by \$0.7 million or 2.0 per cent).

GDP Income and Expenditure tables for 2012 are expected to be released by Statistics Canada in the fall of 2013. Statistics Canada estimates that real GDP growth for PEI in 2011 was 1.6 per cent. Growth between 2010 and 2011 was largely the result of growth in gross fixed capital formation, final consumption expenditure and increases investment in inventories. Real gross domestic product was also revised up for both 2008 and 2009 to 0.9 per cent and 0.3 per cent respectively. Growth for 2010 remained at 2.6 per cent.


The change in the *All-Items Consumer Price Index* (CPI) for Prince Edward Island was 2.0 per cent in 2012. Leading factors contributing to this were higher prices for *energy* (up by 3.2 per cent) and *food* (up by 4.1 per cent). In Canada, prices increased by 1.5 per cent in 2012.

Employment on Prince Edward Island increased by 1.1 per cent in 2012 to average 72,800 for the year. Total labour income increased by 3.4 per cent. The unemployment rate averaged 11.3 per cent in 2012, no change from 2011. According to the Survey of Employment, Payrolls and Hours, employment on Prince Edward Island declined by 0.7 per cent in 2012.

Manufacturing shipments on Prince Edward Island increased by 6.1 per cent to \$1,284.0 million in 2012, up from \$1,210.6 in 2011. According to Industry Canada, the value of P.E.I.'s international exports of goods rose by 15.4 per cent in 2012 to \$870.9 million, following a 5.5 per cent increase in 2011.

## The Canadian Economy

Statistics Canada estimates that the Canadian economy expanded by 1.5 per cent in 2012. This compares to a 2.0 per cent increase in 2011 and a 3.3 per cent increase in 2010. Diagram 1 shows quarterly real GDP growth between 2009 and 2012.



Since emerging from recession in the third quarter of 2009, the Canadian Economy had seven quarters of economic growth, one quarter of contraction in the second quarter of 2011, followed by six more quarters of growth. Through 2012, growth in services was positive, advancing 2.2 per cent over 2011. After contributing positively to economic growth through all of 2011, goods industries saw a slight decline in the second quarter of 2012, however rebounded in the final two quarters to see an annual increase of 1.6 per cent over 2011.

The consumer price index increased 2.0 per cent in 2012. Increases were seen across all components, with notable gains in food, up 2.4 per cent, transportation, up 2.0 per cent, energy, up 1.7 per cent, and housing, up 1.2 per cent. Core inflation was 1.3 per cent in 2012.

Employment gains were recorded in both the goods and service sectors, at 1.8 and 1.0 per cent respectively. Notable employment gains include educational services, up 5.6 per cent, other services, up 4.8 per cent, and health care and social assistance, up 1.7 per cent. Notable declines occurred in trade, down 1.0 per cent, public administration, down 1.6 per cent and scientific and technical services, down 0.8 per cent. The unemployment rate averaged 7.2 per cent in 2012, a decline of 0.2 percentage points from 2011.



## The American Economy

After growing by 1.8 per cent in 2011, real GDP increased 2.2 per cent in 2012. Increases to real GDP were broadly based across most sectors of the economy. Detracting from GDP in 2012 were expenditures by federal, state and local governments.


The employment situation in the United States continues to improve. After expanding by 1.2 per cent in 2011, average non-farm payroll employment grew by 1.7 per cent in 2012, or 2.2 million jobs. Job gains, though modest have been sustained month to month, with employment growing every month since October 2010. Though the situation is improving, the United States remains approximately 3.9 million jobs below its pre-recession peak recorded in 2007.

After peaking in 2010 at 9.6 per cent, the average annual unemployment rate continues to trend downward in the United States, finishing 2012 with an average of 8.1 per cent. Unemployment has been under 8.0 per cent since September of 2012, and finished the year at 7.8 per cent. This is still markedly higher than in the years prior to the recession. The number of unemployed persons as of December 2012 was 12.2 million. Of those people, the long term unemployed, those who have been out of work for more than 27 weeks, account for 4.8 million or nearly 40 per cent of the total unemployed.

## The Prince Edward Island Economy



#### Gross Domestic Product

Statistics Canada preliminary estimates of GDP by Industry indicate that the Prince Edward Island economy expanded by 1.2 per cent in chained 2007 dollars in 2012, following 1.7 per cent growth in 2011 and 2.8 per cent growth in 2010. Diagram 4 shows growth in provincial Gross Domestic Product (GDP) by Industry since 2001.



#### **Consumer Prices**

The *All-Items Consumer Price Index* for Prince Edward Island increased by 2.0 per cent in 2012, compared to a rise of 1.5 per cent nationally. Core inflation, the year-over-year rate of change of the CPI excluding food, energy and the effects of changes in indirect taxes, rose by 1.2 per cent in 2012.

Energy prices continued to rise in 2012, however at a much slower rate than in 2011. Energy prices rose 3.2 per cent in 2012 as compared to 12.3 per cent in 2011. Diagram 5 shows the annual average price of unleaded gasoline and fuel oil sold on Prince Edward Island between 2005 and 2012. Early 2012 saw a gradual increase in gasoline prices (regular self-serve) peaking for the year at \$1.341 per litre in April, following four months of price decline at the end of 2011. Gasoline prices then declined once again to reach a low of \$1.165 per litre in July. Following





two months of increases, prices declined in the

fourth quarter to finish the year at \$1.199 per litre in December. The price of home heating oil in 2012 ranged from a low \$1.043 per litre in January to a high of \$1.141 per litre in March. #### Labour Force

The annual average of total employment on Prince Edward Island increased by 1.1 per cent from 72,000 in 2011 to 72,800 in 2012. Employment in the goods-producing sector decreased by 1.1 per cent in 2012, while employment in the service providing sector increased by 1.7 per cent.





Diagram 6 indicates that a total of 1,400 jobs were created in business and financial services, transportation and warehousing, health, education, and public administration, other services, primary industries, and utilities in 2012. The remaining sectors accounted for a loss of 600 jobs.<sup>2</sup> The labour force participation rate decreased slightly from 68.1 per cent in 2011 to 68.0 per cent in 2012. The annual average unemployment rate has remained steady for three years, going from 11.2 per cent in 2010 to 11.3 per cent in 2011 and remaining at 11.3 per cent in 2012. Statistics Canada's Survey of Employment, Payrolls and Hours shows that employment on Prince Edward Island decreased by 0.7 per cent in 2012, the first annual decline according to that measure since 2006. The largest declines were seen in management services, administrative support, and health and social services. Sectors showing the most growth were accommodation and food services, manufacturing, and professional services. For more information about the labour force see Tables 16 to 22.

#### Income

Statistics Canada estimates that labour income for Prince Edward Island rose 3.4 per cent to reach \$2,872 million in 2012. Diagram 7 shows labour income growth from 2002 to 2012. The major contributors to growth in 2012 were in manufacturing (up by 7.0 per cent), professional and personal services (up by 2.7 per cent), and educational services (up by 4.1 per cent). ## **Population**

On July 1, 2012, the population of Prince Edward Island was estimated at 146,105, an increase of 410 persons or 0.3 per cent from 2011. While this growth rate was the highest in Atlantic Canada, it was below the national average of 1.1 per cent. Preliminary data show that 1,379 immigrants chose Prince Edward Island as their new home in 2011/12 while 20 emigrants left the Island, resulting in a total of 1,272 for net international migration. Net interprovincial migration was -1,252, with Ontario, Alberta, and Nova Scotia being the top destinations of Islanders leaving for other provinces. Between July 1, 2011 and June 30, 2012 the total number of Island births was an estimated 1,420. The number of deaths was estimated to be 1,344, an increase of 2.3 per cent. Thus population growth by natural increase amounted to only 76 during that period, an all time low for Prince Edward Island.


The aging of the Island population is illustrated by the fact that the median age has risen from 24.8 years in 1971 to 42.6 years in 2012. Furthermore, while 11 per cent of the population was 65 years and older in 1971, this proportion had risen to 16.4 per cent in 2012.

According to the 2011 Census of Population count on May 10, 2011 there were 140,204 persons living on Prince Edward Island. Revised population estimates based on the 2011 Census will be published by Statistics Canada in the fall of 2013. For more information on population and Census see Tables 1 to 15.

#### **Industrial Profiles**

## Manufacturing

Diagram 8 shows total manufacturing shipments for Prince Edward Island from 2007 to 2012. Total shipments increased by 6.1 per cent in 2012 to a value of \$1,284 million. This followed a slight increase in 2011 and three straight years of decline from 2008 to 2010. Food manufacturing increased by 4.0 per cent in 2012, boosted by a 12.7 per cent increase in fish products.

Other food manufacturing (excluding fish) grew by 1.8 per cent. Total shipments excluding food increased by 9.0 per cent in 2012. Employment in the manufacturing sector fell by 3.8 per cent in 2012, the fifth straight year of employment decline in this sector. The number of employed persons in the manufacturing sector was 5,000.



#### **Exports**

According to Industry Canada, the total value of exported goods grew from \$754.6 million in 2011 to \$871.0 million in 2012, an increase of 15.4 per cent. Exports of *frozen food products* made up 24.0 per cent of all international exports of goods in 2012. Its value increased from \$182.6 million in 2011 to \$208.8 million in 2012, an increase of 14.4 per cent. Other exports included *seafood products* valued at \$1401.8 million (up by 14.9 per cent from 2011), \$64.7 million in *engine and turbine equipment* exports, (up by 105.4 per cent) and \$63.5 million in *aerospace products and parts* (up by 60.3 per cent). ### Agriculture

Farm cash receipts for 2012 totaled \$466.7 million, a decrease of 2.2 per cent over 2011. This compares to an increase of 7.5 per cent for Canada as a whole. Total crop receipts totaled \$306.3 million, a decrease of 1.5 per cent over 2011, due largely to a 4.3 per cent decline in potato receipts. Total livestock receipts grew for the third consecutive year, increasing by 4.8 per cent. Cattle receipts declined by 1.9 per cent, while hog receipts increased by 6.3 per cent. Dairy receipts also saw an increase, rising by 2.6 per cent.


#### Retail Trade

Retail sales on Prince Edward Island in 2012 increased for the third year in a row with a 3.4 per cent increase. Diagram 9 shows retails sales since 2002. Sales were valued at \$1,931.6 million. Higher food prices were reflected in a 3.9 per cent increase in sales at supermarkets with sales of \$372.7 million. Motor vehicle and parts dealers also saw a significant increase, up 11.9 per cent or \$41.3 million. Sales were down at gasoline stations (down 0.5 per cent or \$1.4 million) and pharmacies and personal care stores (down 2.9 per cent or \$4.1 million). The number of new vehicles sold saw an increase of 805 vehicles with a total of 6,600 vehicles sold, an all time high for new vehicles sold on PEI. The value of new vehicles sold was \$178.1 million (up 9.7 per cent), also an all time high. Employment in the wholesale/retail trade sector decreased by 3.0 per cent to 9,700 people in 2012. Employment in this sector remains the largest private sector employer in the province. For information about the retail trade sector see Tables 47 and 48.

### Fisheries and Forestry

The Department of Fisheries, Aquaculture and Rural Development estimates that the value of total fish landings in 2012 increased by 23.6 per cent to \$170.4 million. Molluscs and crustaceans continue to be the top species of the Island fishery comprising 93.4 per cent of the total value of all fish landings. Lobster landings rebounded by 31.6 per cent to 27.3 million pounds, following a decline in 2011. The value of lobster landings increased for the first time in six years to value \$113.8 million, up by 59.2 per cent from 2011. Lobster prices rose slightly by 0.1 per cent to \$4.20/lb. The value of other crustaceans and molluscs declined by 16.5 per cent in 2012.

Landings of groundfish, pelagic and estuarial fish were 15.0 per cent lower than last year, falling to 23.2 million pounds. Prices increased in 2012 for cod (up by 27.6 per cent to \$1.12/lb.), herring (up by 84.9 per cent to 27.0 cents/lb.), mackerel (up by 4.1 per cent to 46.0 cents/lb.), smelts (up by 146.2 per cent to \$1.12/lb.), rock crab (up by 11.7 per cent to 45.0 cents/lb.), oysters (up by 13.5 per cent to \$1.26/lb.), mussels (up by 1.8 per cent to 58.0 cents/lb.), and Irish moss (up by 19.0 per cent to 12.5 cents/lb.). Lower prices were seen for snow crab (down by 23.1 per cent to \$2.50/lb.). For more data on fisheries see Tables 73 to 77.

The *P.E.I. Department of Environment, Energy and Forestry* estimates that the total volume of wood harvested on Prince Edward Island increased from 325,000 cubic metres in 2009 to 384,000 cubic metres in 2010, an increase of 18.2 per cent. Diagram 10 shows wood production since 2003. Industrial wood production increased by 30.2 per cent in 2010, while the consumption of fuel wood and fuel chips increased by 15.8 per cent. #### **Tourism**


Occupancy rates at Island accommodations decreased by 1.0 percentage point, while the number of overnight stays decreased by 2.0 per cent. Campgrounds continued to do well in 2012, with sight night's sold up 4.4 per cent and the occupancy rate up 0.7 percentage points. Cruise ship passengers to the Island increased by 10.0 per cent, with 51 ships bringing just over 99,000 passengers and crew to the Island. Air traffic increased by 4.3 per cent in 2012, while ferry traffic grew by 1.1 per cent. Bridge traffic increased by 1.2 per cent.

#### Construction and Investment

Statistics Canada estimates that total investment on Prince Edward Island was \$986.4 million in 2012, a decrease of 8.7 per cent over the previous year. Public sector investment decreased from \$390.6 million in 2011 to \$288.0 million in 2012, a decrease of 26.3 per cent, while private sector investment grew by 1.3 per cent, from \$689.6 million in 2011 to \$698.5 million in 2012.

Non-residential investment declined by 0.6 per cent in 2012, due mainly to a 29.0 per cent decrease in government and institutional investment. Industrial investment saw an increase of 34.5 per cent, while commercial investment was up 14.3 per cent.

Residential investment increased 6.1 per cent in 2012, largely due to increased investment in row housing, apartments and renovations. These segments increased 56.0 per cent, 12.2 per cent, and 8.1 per cent respectively. Investment in singles declined in 2012, falling 5.3 per cent.

The Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC) estimated that there were 941 new housing starts on Prince Edward Island in 2012, the most housing starts since 1988,

however just one more than in 2011. As seen in

Diagram 11, row housing increased from 47 starts in 2011 to 127 in 2012. The number of semi-detached and duplex starts also increased, from 70 in 2011 to 94 in 2012. Single dwelling housing starts also decreased in 2012, going from 431 in 2011 to 387 in 2012, a decrease of 10.2 per cent.

## **Transportation**

The total number of passengers travelling through Charlottetown Airport increased in 2012, rising from 285,158 in 2011 to 297,329 or 4.3 per cent. 148,045 passengers flew into Prince Edward Island (up 4.5 per cent from 2011), while 149,284 people left the province by air (up by 4.0 per cent).

In 2012 the volume of product received at Island seaports, including fertilizer, sand, stone and gravel, had a total weight of 836,522 metric tonnes, down by 3.2 per cent from the previous year. During the same period 14,268 metric tonnes of water freight, mainly potatoes, was shipped from the Summerside port. More transportation data can be found in Tables 91 and 92.

#### The Public Service Sector

Statistics Canada's *Survey of Employment, Earnings and Hours* (SEPH) indicates that employment in *public administration* (federal, provincial and municipal) decreased by 2.1 per cent in 2012. Employment in the *health and social services* sector decreased by 2.3 per cent, while employment in the *education* sector decreased by 1.2 per cent.

## **Provincial Finance**

The provincial *Public Accounts*, Consolidated Statement of Operations shows that the Province of Prince Edward Island received \$1,574.0 million in total revenue in fiscal year (FY) 2011/12, 2.7 per cent higher than in FY 2010/11. Provincial own-source revenues were valued at \$936.2 million that year, an increase of 7.1 per cent from a year earlier. Total federal transfers to Prince Edward Island contributed 39.7 per cent to the province's total revenue in FY 2011/12 compared to 41.9 per cent in the last fiscal year. Equalization payments decreased by 3.0 per cent to value \$329.0 million, while Canada Health and Social Transfer (CHST) payments advanced 5.0 per cent to total \$165.4 million that fiscal year. Total expenditures rose by 3.5 per cent to reach \$1,652 million.

The Consolidated Statement of Operations also shows a deficit for FY 2011/12 in the amount of \$78.5 million. As of March 31, 2012 the provincial net debt was \$1,851.4 million, up 8.3 per cent from 2011. More data on the government sector can be found at Tables 109 to 113.












